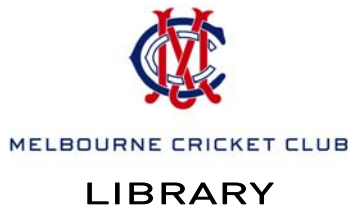

TOM LAHIFF

Lahiff is probably best known as Harry Beitzel's 3AW offsider who interviewed players in the changerooms after matches. Lahiff was originally recruited to Essendon from Port Melbourne and played 49 games (67 goals) with the Bombers from 1935 to 1937 season. He later played six games (10 goals) with South Melbourne in 1942 before moving to Hawthorn during that season. He played a further 19 games (23 goals) and was the Hawks' captain/coach in 1944, his last year with the club.

Lahiff is described in *The Encyclopedia of AFL Footballers* as a "tough and gutsy small man". He was 5'6" tall and weighed nine and a half stone but in his early years his talent was such that he was allegedly approached when playing for the VFA in a representative match against a VFL side by a Carlton player, who produced a Form 4 from his sock for Lahiff to sign. Lahiff also was a fine District cricketer, representing St Kilda for many years.

MARK WILLIAMS

Son of Port Adelaide legend Fos Williams, Mark played 135 games (178 goals) for Collingwood between 1981 and 1986, and 66 games (58 goals) for Brisbane between 1987 and 1990. Williams represented Victoria and won the Magpies' best and fairest award, the Copeland Trophy, in his first season with the club. He also played in their losing grand final side.

He was appointed captain in 1983 and kept the position until he left in 1986, winning the Copeland Trophy again in 1985. After a contract dispute, Williams was unable to settle his differences with Leigh Matthews and moved to Brisbane. At the end of his playing career in 1990 he unsuccessfully sought an assistant coaching position with Collingwood. Consequently, he took up a similar post with Kevin Sheedy at Essendon and then eventually moved on to the senior coaching position with Port Adelaide in 1999, where he guided the club to its first AFL premiership in 2004.

After an eight-game losing streak in 2010, Williams stepped down as coach, ending a successful 274-game coaching stint during which he guided the side to 151 wins and no fewer than 17 finals appearances.

A BIG WIN

Port Adelaide's greatest winning margin against any side was in Round 13, 2005 when they defeated Hawthorn by 117 points at Football Park. The game was relatively close until half time, with Port Adelaide four goals up at the main break. But the second half saw them slam on seventeen goals to the Hawks' two. Warren Tredrea kicked seven goals for the match, and Port ran out winners 29.14 (188) to Hawthorn's 10.11 (71). Port's score is also their highest since they entered the AFL in 1997. Tredrea is Port Adelaide's leading goalkicker with 549 goals in his 255 games with the club since his debut during the 1997 season.

This Round in History – Round 21 on the MCG

The highest score is 28.19 (187) by Richmond against Fitzroy 5.6 (36) in 1996. The overall Round 21 highest score is 35.15 (225) by Hawthorn against Geelong 13.12 (90) at Princes Park in 1986.

The most goals by an individual at the MCG for this round is 11 by Bernie Quinlan for Fitzroy against North Melbourne in 1984. Fitzroy kicked 26.9 (165) and won by 54 points. The overall Round 21 goalkicking record is 13 by Tony Lockett for St Kilda

against Carlton at Waverley Park in 1991. St Kilda kicked 23.17 (155) to win by 54 points.

The highest score in a quarter is 11.7 (73) by Richmond in the last quarter against Fitzroy in 1996. The overall Round 21 record is 13.4 (82) by Hawthorn against Geelong in the last quarter at Princes Park in 1986.

The highest Round 21 attendance at the MCG was recorded on Saturday August 21, 1993 when 85,054 saw Carlton defeat Collingwood by 54 points.

PLAYED FOR BOTH – STUART DEW

Stuart Dew played 180 games (245 goals) for Port Adelaide between 1997 and 2006. At the end of the 2007 season he was drafted by the Hawks where he played 26 games (20 goals). Recruited to Port Adelaide from Central Districts, Dew became a favourite with Port fans with his prodigious kicking and was a member of their 2004 premiership side.

Injury dogged Dew throughout his career and by the end of 2006 he was struggling both mentally and physically. He contracted not to play at all during 2007 but Hawks coach Alistair Clarkson was keen to acquire his services and he was transferred to Hawthorn in 2008 where he put in a match-winning performance in their grand final victory over Geelong that year.

DID YOU KNOW?

1. Despite his side finishing on the bottom of the ladder with just four wins in 1965, Hawthorn's full forward John Peck led the VFL goalkicking with 56 goals. In 2006 Carlton's Brendan Fevola won the Coleman Medal with 84 goals, but the Blues also were wooden spooners with just three wins for the season.
2. The term "wooden spoon" was originally used at Cambridge University and described a spoon that was presented to the student achieving the lowest score in the mathematical honours degree.
3. Former Collingwood player Bill Twomey Snr took over the coaching position at Hawthorn in 1933 in tragic circumstances. St Kilda's Fred Phillips was originally engaged but died of blood poisoning before he could take up the position.
