AFL 2024 ROUND 2 ST KILDA V COLLINGWOOD

THE FIRST LEAGUE MATCH BETWEEN THE TEAMS

Collingwood and St Kilda were two of the eight original members of the Victorian Football League (VFL) and they met in the very first round of VFL matches on May 8, 1897. This first VFL encounter took place at Collingwood's home ground (Victoria Park) with Collingwood running out winners by 25 points. The final scores were Collingwood 5.11 (41) to St Kilda 2.4 (16). St Kilda had put two goals on the board in the first half and trailed by 13 points at half time, 4.3 (27) to 2.2 (14). They could, however, only add two behinds in the second half to Collingwood's one goal eight. Both the behinds were scored in the third quarter. St Kilda's goal-kickers were Danny Dunne and Reg Stewart, while Harry Dowdall, Jim Gregory, Frank Hailwood, Rhoda McDonald and Lardie Tulloch all scored single goals for the Magpies. Collingwood won the return match at the Junction Oval in Round 8 of the 1897 season and then proceeded to win their next 16 games against St Kilda. St Kilda's first win over Collingwood did not come until 1904, when they defeated the Magpies by 15 points in Round 7 at the Junction Oval.

THE FIRST FINAL BETWEEN THE TEAMS

Despite the fact that Collingwood and St Kilda had both made the VFL finals in 1907, 1908 and 1913, the first finals encounter between the teams did not take place until 1918. Collingwood finished the 1918 home and away season in second place on the ladder with ten wins and four losses, while St Kilda was in fourth place with eight wins and six losses. Under the finals system in operation at the time, the second and fourth placed teams played a knockout match in the first week of the finals, so Collingwood and St Kilda met at the MCG on Saturday, August 17, before a crowd of 28,375. After an even first quarter, Collingwood led by four points at the first break - 2.5 to 2.1 - but four goals to St Kilda, and only two to Collingwood, in the second quarter gave St Kilda an 11 point lead at the main break. St Kilda were still in front by seven points at the final change, but they scored only one behind in the final quarter, while Collingwood kicked two goals five. The Magpies, therefore, ran out winners by nine points. The final scores were Collingwood 7.16 (58) to St Kilda 7.7 (49). Tom Wraith kicked three goals for Collingwood and Dick Lee two. Les Boyd and Dave McNamara both kicked two goals for St Kilda. Collingwood's win put them into what proved to be the grand final game against South Melbourne at the MCG on September 7. South won a very close game by five points after trailing for most of the day. South had finished on top of the ladder after the home and away season and were declared "minor premiers". Had Collingwood beaten them on September 7, South would have had the right to challenge the Magpies to another game, which would have decided the premiership. The 1918 football season was the last to take place during the First World War. It was not until the Second World War had commenced in 1939 that Collingwood and St Kilda met next in a final. On Saturday, September 23, 1939, Collingwood defeated St Kilda by 29 points in the preliminary final. The following week, the Magpies went down to Melbourne in the grand final.

DID YOU KNOW?

In Round 10, 1918, at Victoria Park, Collingwood full forward Dick Lee was held goalless in a game against South Melbourne. Prior to this, he had played 97 VFL games in a row in which he had kicked at least one goal. It was in Round 8, 1910, against University at Victoria Park that he had last played a game without kicking a goal.

THIS ROUND IN HISTORY - ROUND 2 ON THE MCG

The highest Round 2 score on the MCG was in 1990 when North Melbourne thrashed Richmond 32.17 (209) to 9.14 (68). North's John Longmire kicked 12 goals that night, still the most kicked by an individual in Round 2 at the MCG. The Roos kicked 13.3 (81) in the first quarter, which is the highest Round 2 quarter score. The highest ever Round 2 score was at Princes Park in 1969 by Carlton who defeated Hawthorn 30.30 (210) to 12.10 (82). Richmond's Doug Strang has the best Round 2 individual goalkicking performance with 14 goals at the Punt Road Oval against North in 1931. The biggest crowd at the MCG for Round 2 is 85,063 who saw Collingwood 14.16 (100) defeat Carlton 9.12 (66) in 1994. It is common for games to feature multiple goalkickers. However, in Round 2 at the MCG in 1934 only five players kicked goals when Melbourne 20.13 (133) defeated Hawthorn 6.8 (44). Melbourne's goalkickers were Allan La Fontaine (nine goals), Jack Mueller (seven) and Percy Beames (four). Jack Green (four) and Ted Poole (two) kicked Hawthorn's goals.

Unfurling the Flag

While Collingwood succeeded in defeating St Kilda in the first VFL round of 1897, all did not go well pre-match when the 1896 premiership flag was unfurled. Collingwood had won the Victorian Football Association (VFA) premiership the previous season by defeating South Melbourne in a play-off match. The *Argus* reported the following:

Collingwood began with a bad omen. The new pennant was to be unfurled with eclat, and the mayor and mayoress were present for the ceremony. The mayoress was to have performed the office, but when the critical moment came, and Mr. Beasley, MLA, invited Mrs. Cody to pull the lanyard and release the pennant, there was a hitch, and the flag remained sulkily furled. Something had to be done. Councillor Cody seized the rope, and gave such a lusty pull that the flagstaff was momentarily in danger of being wrenched from its fastenings, when, fortunately, the rope broke just at the right place, and the flag fluttered out bravely in the light breeze, and a cheer announced the ceremony complete.
