PLAYERS WHO APPEARED WITH BOTH CLUBS

Noel McMahan – A Demon champion and a South Melbourne coach

Noel McMahan was recruited to Melbourne from Mordialloc. He played with Melbourne from 1946 to 1956 in 175 games with 28 goals. He was a strong and feared defender who found his place as a dashing half back. He had good judgement and ball control. He was a member of the Demons' 1948 flag victory against Essendon. McMahan captained Melbourne to their 1955 and 1956 premierships. Honours included the Melbourne best and fairest award in 1951 and state selection on four occasions. After success coaching country side, Rochester, McMahan joined South Melbourne as coach for the years 1962 to 1964. He was honoured by being named a half back flanker in the Demons' Team of the Century in 2000.

Percy Taylor – Three Clubs due to War Time

Taylor was a rover at 5'6" (168cm) and 11st (70kg). He joined Geelong from local team Geelong West and represented Geelong from 1939 to 1941 in 25 games with 21 goals. Geelong were absent from the VFL in 1942 and 1943; in 1943 he joined South Melbourne for one year with seven games, contributing 16 goals. He then joined Melbourne from 1944 to 1945 where he played nine games and kicked 19 goals. In his VFL career he played 41 games and kicked 56 goals.

Harry Brereton – A Leading Forward who Topped the VFL Goalkicking

Recruited from Port Melbourne, Harry Brereton played with Melbourne in 1909 to 1912 and 1915. He recorded 85 games and registered 187 goals. He returned to League football in 1919 to 1922 when he played with South Melbourne in 17 games with 52 goals. His VFL career involved 102 matches and 239 goals. In 1912 he led the league goalkicking with 56 and represented the VFL against the Ballarat League team. He was Melbourne's leading goalkicker in the years 1909, 1911 and 1912. Brereton was a keen district cricketer with South Melbourne where he played as both a wicket-keeper and batsman. He later joined Port Melbourne in sub-district cricket. Harry Brereton was secretary of the Victorian Cricket Association for 25 years until his death, after a long illness, on December 31, 1950, aged 63.

DID YOU KNOW?

The tradition of the umpire bouncing the ball in the centre of the ground for the ruck contest was not the original method for ball ups. Early footage shows umpires striking the ball by hand. The ball would then strike the ground and rise for the ruck contest. Umpires were still using this method up until the 1930s.

This Round in History – Round 12 on the MCG

The highest Round 12 score on the MCG is 25.16 (166) by Richmond against South Melbourne in 1979. The overall Round 12 highest score is 29.15 (189) by South Melbourne against St Kilda 2.6(18) at the Lakeside Oval in 1919. The highest score in a quarter for Round 12 on the MCG is 10.5 (65) by Melbourne in the last quarter against South Melbourne in 1936. The overall Round 12 highest score in a quarter is 17.4 (106) by South Melbourne in the last quarter against St Kilda at the Lakeside Oval in 1919. The biggest bag of goals on the MCG in Round 12 was 10 kicked by Brian Taylor for Richmond against Fitzroy in 1982 and Jack Riewoldt for Richmond against West Coast in 2010. The overall Round 12 goalkicking record is 17 by Gordon Coventry for Collingwood against Fitzroy at Victoria Park in 1930. The highest Round 12 attendance was recorded at the MCG in 2018 when 83,518 fans saw the Queen's Birthday clash between Melbourne and Collingwood.

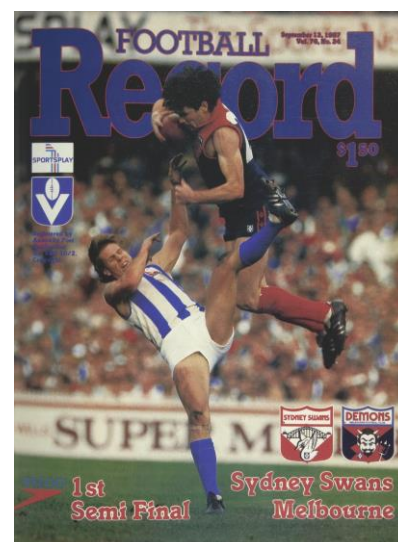

THE TWO FINALS BETWEEN MELBOURNE AND THE SWANS

- The 1936 preliminary final at the MCG saw South Melbourne 13.11 (89) defeat Melbourne 8.15 (63) before a crowd of 49,758. For the Swans Bob Pratt recorded five goals while Melbourne's Eric "Tarzan" Glass kicked three goals. The Swans continued to the Grand Final against Collingwood but were defeated by eleven points.
- The first semi final in 1987 at the MCG (*Football Record* shown right) saw Melbourne 21.23 (149) soundly defeat Sydney 10.13 (73) before a crowd of 80,292. Goalkickers for the Demons were: Robert Flower (4), Tony Campbell (3) and Greg Healy (3). Three Sydney players each kicked two goals, they were Tony Morwood, Dennis Carroll and Gerard Healy.
